

Regional Accreditation Territories

Middle States Commission on Higher Education - Postsecondary institutions in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the US Virgin Islands.

New England Association of Schools and Colleges - Educational institutions in the six New England states (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Vermont).

Higher Learning Commission - Educational institutions in Arkansas, Arizona, Colorado, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Dakota, Nebraska, New Mexico, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Wisconsin, West Virginia, and Wyoming.



Regional Accreditation Territories

Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU) - Postsecondary institutions in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, and Washington.

Southern Association of Colleges and Schools - Educational institutions in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

Western Association of Schools and Colleges - 4-year educational institutions in California, Hawaii, Guam, American Samoa, Micronesia, Palau, and Northern Marianas Islands, as well as schools for American children in Asia; and, Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges.



Focus of the Self Study

1. MSCHE's accreditation process ensures institutional accountability, selfappraisal, improvement, and innovation through peer review and the rigorous application of standards within the context of institutional mission.

2. Verification of Compliance with Accreditation-Relevant Federal Regulations – including MSCHE guidelines on student identity verification in distance and correspondence education, transfer of credit policies and articulation agreements, Title IV (financial aid) program responsibilities, assignment of credit hours, institutional record of student complaints, required information for students and the public, standing with state and other accrediting agencies, and contractual relationships.
