ASCEND PROGRAM UPDATES

This year our fifths cohort successfully concluded their two-year training as ASCEND scholars with another stellar presentation of their research projects. This cohort has been a very special one in several ways. They were our first cohort of scholars who moved through their training without the benefit of an eight-week long Summer Research Institute (SRI) preparation. Instead, they took on, and successfully completed the challenge of a semester-long course, SCIE 200, which replaced the SRI in a condensed curriculum. They took this course during an otherwise busy academic year. Cohort 5 did not miss a beat! Moreover, cohort 5 completed the seminal last year of their work under Covid restrictions, without access to in person research facilities and mentors. They worked but on Zoom and online and to an extent, alone. Instead of giving in to these limitations they allowed their research projects to become enriched by the special challenges they and their communities have faced and addressed questions of new significance. This was a display of true ADCEND entrepreneurship.

Cohort 6, admitted in the middle of the Covid summer of 2020, has battled their own challenges. They never even had the benefit of bonding in person, before entering the fray of training to become an entrepreneurial researcher. Cohort 6 has shown their resilience and forged ahead to fulfil their academic and research goals. All members of cohort 6 have successfully placed in summer research projects this year, in some cases with mentors they first encountered in their SCIE 200 "bootcamp" training.

Bolutife Baiyewu, the "Farewell" speaker of the graduate awards celebrations of the SCMNS this spring and ASCEND scholar, cohort 3, has referred to her class ('20) and the Morgan graduating class of 2021 as the "diamond class, ...forged under pressure into diamonds". We think that the same can be said for ASCEND cohort 6 and 5. They will continue to shine bright.

Dr. Ingrid K. Tulloch joined Morgan State University as an Assistant Professor of Psychology in 2018. She teaches the scientific methods, senior research thesis, and physiological psychology courses. Dr. Tulloch also serves as the Director of the Animal Research Core Facility, a National Institute of Health-supported Research Centers in Minority Institutions (RCMI) core laboratory at Morgan State. Dr. Tulloch earned a BA in psychology with special honors at Hunter College and a Ph.D. in psychology specializing in biological psychology and behavioral neuroscience at the City University of New York Graduate School. She completed post-doctoral research in the Molecular Neuropsychiatry Branch of the National Institutes of Health's National Institute on Drug Abuse. Dr. Tulloch's research uses animal models and human participant research on addiction, violence, and aggression to understand how early life experiences and biopsychosocial processes influence these risky health behaviors. Her recent research has focused on psychosocial factors such as discrimination and the corresponding stress and immune responses to predict risky health behaviors and cognition.

LEAD MENTOR SPOTLIGHT

She has co-authored papers on the molecular mechanisms of methamphetamine and nicotine neurotoxicity and related behaviors. Dr. Tulloch has mentored over thirty undergraduate students in psychology and neuroscience and belongs to several professional organizations devoted to research, teaching, and mentoring in these disciplines. In her spare time, Dr. Tulloch gardens and volunteers as a statistics tutor at the Maryland Correctional Institute in Jessup, MD.

The 36th Annual Mae P. Claytor and Martin D. Jenkins Behavioral Science Research Conference was held on April 27th via Zoom. Students in the Behavioral and Social Sciences presented their original research or community organization program evaluations. Over 150 people attended. The keynote speaker was biological psychologist Dr. Michele K. Lewis who is a professor at Winston-Salem State ASCEND Scholars Layschel Kemp University. (Cohort 5), Alexus McKoy (Cohort 6), Kayla Mercer (Cohort 6), and Destinee Young (Cohort 6) presented their ASCEND research projects. Chyna Roger (Cohort 6) received the Carrol S. Perrino Scholarship. ASCEND SCHOLAR SPOTLIGHT


