

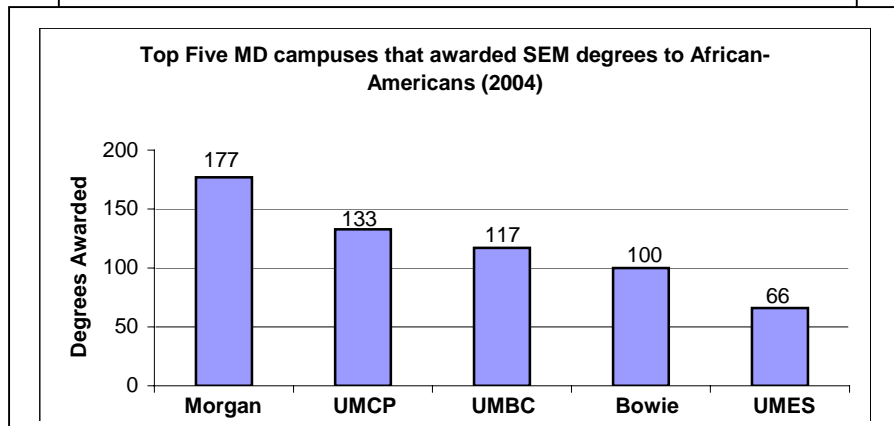
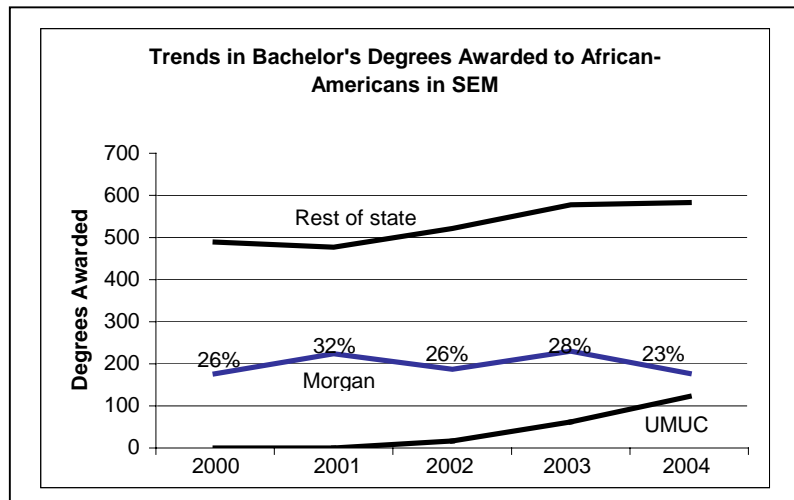

Bachelor's Degrees Awarded to African-Americans in Science, Engineering and Math (SEM)

Morgan continues to lead the state in the number of bachelor's degrees awarded to African-Americans in the biological, computer and physical sciences as well as engineering and math. Over the past five years (2000-2004), Morgan has averaged over a quarter of the state's bachelor's SEM degrees to African-Americans. Despite offering only the basic programs in those fields, Morgan surpassed the second leading campus, UMCP, by 33%. However, in 2004, Morgan's total number of SEM degrees to African-Americans dropped modestly (-5%), while the rest of the state (as a whole) remained level. The peak year for the University was in 2001, when it awarded 32% of the state's SEM degrees to African Americans. The primary upsurge in the state's SEM degrees is driven by the computer science and information science degrees granted by University of Maryland University College, which doubled its numbers in the last two years. If UMUC is taken out of the equation, Morgan accounts for 23% of SEM bachelor's degrees to African-Americans.
