WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A SPONSORED PROJECT AND A GIFT?

SPONSORED PROJECTS VS. GIFTS

- Sponsored project characteristics:
 - Restriction of the use of funds to certain activities
 - Requirement for programmatic or technical report
 - Requirement for fiscal report and/or audit
 - Provision of disposition of intangible property, such as patents, copyrights, inventions, or licenses that may result from the activity.
- Gifts usually do not have those strings attached.

WHAT ARE THE THREE MAIN TYPES OF SPONSORED PROJECTS?

TYPES OF SPONSORED PROJECTS

- Grants
 - Assistance, freedom to act
 - For public good
- Cooperative agreements
 - Assistance, more involvement from the sponsor
 - For public good
- Contracts
 - Acquisition of goods or services
 - For the benefit of the sponsor
 - On-time, to the specifications

WHO ARE THE PEOPLE RUNNING THE PROJECT?

MSU PERSONNEL

- Principal Investigator (PI)
 - Leading the project
 - Responsible for many aspects of the project
 - Almost always named
- Other key personnel
 - Adds to expertise and necessary for the project
 - Named
- Other personnel
 - Has a role but less crucial or unique
 - Could be TBD

EXTERNAL TO MSU

Consultants

- Representing themselves
- Given to the individual
- Note: limited to individuals outside MSU

Subaward recipients

- Representing their institution
- Given to the institution
- Major involvement in design and decisions

Vendors

- Purchasing a good or service
- No major involvement in decisions
- Usually provide similar services to others as well

WHO CAN SERVE AS THE PI?

- MSU guideline is that the PI must be a tenured or tenure track faculty member, a senior staff, or an administrative officer of the University.
- The PI must have substantial expertise and experience in the field, and must be able to run the project according to the terms and conditions of the award.

MORE THAN ONE PI?

- Some sponsors allow that.
- There should be a good reason.
- There must be a plan for conflict resolution.
- Often only one is the contact person for with the sponsor.

CAN THE PI SUBMIT THE PROPOSAL DIRECTLY TO THE SPONSOR?

- No, not on behalf of MSU.
- Some sponsors (e.g., NIH, NSF, DoD) simply do not allow that.
- Even if the sponsor allows, it is against MSU's policy. Any sponsored award has some risks, which need to be evaluated before submission.

WHY IS THE PI NOT ALLOWED...

- to submit or accept a sponsored award?
 - For the purpose of accounting.
 - Numbers
 - Budget
 - Cost allowability
 - Indirect cost rate
 - Sponsored awards, while great, carry some risks as well. This is especially true for contracts.

WHAT IS RISKY ABOUT SPONSORED PROJECTS?

RISKS

- Accepting funds from a sponsor with a poor reputation
- Using funds for purposes other than those permitted by the sponsor
- Conflicts of interest
- Fraud and embezzlement of funds
- Failure to comply with standards of ethical research in humans or animal welfare
- Lack of consideration of safety standards when working with hazardous materials
- Fabrication, falsification, or plagiarism when conducting research

POTENTIAL RESTRICTIONS IN CONTRACTS

- Sometimes contracts have clauses that restrict the faculty members from:
 - Publishing the results
 - Presenting the results in seminars
 - Sharing the results with any non-US citizen
 -
